Pastor's Corner

Co-travelers in Christ,

As we enter April here on the eve of Holy Week I find myself wanting to hear this week's story again and listen more attentively this time to whether and where Jesus will break character. That's the big test after all—whether he is who he says he is and whether he will be who he says he will be. It's clear that at a couple of points at least in this most climactic of weeks he considered that question himself. Am I really going to enter this city? Am I really going to turn myself over and "drink this cup"? Am I really going to accept this pain, this cross? Am I really that person? It seems to me that the hidden question there is whether Jesus will still choose to be who he intends to be when the road really gets hard, whether the character he enacts is really *his* character or just shtick. What a great word: "shtick." It comes from Yiddish and means something like "a gimmick; a comic routine"—a façade that one can dawn for a time and hang up on the wall like a coat when you get home. Will Jesus reveal something about his true character or just perform good shtick?

I want to watch closely as he wrestles with that because it seems to me that that's a familiar question and a very practical, everyday thing to consider for anyone taking on the life of faith: will I live into my truest character today or will I hang it up when no one is looking as if it were just shtick? The difference is in who we will choose to be, I think. Just as for Jesus Holy Week is the test of who he will choose to be—whether he will live fully into who he intends to be—so we too are continually faced with such questions, but perhaps never more than during Holy Week. Holy Week concludes this season of self-examination with a profound image of Jesus living fully into the grace that he came to model and embody. Who do we intend to be when the week is through? My prayer for myself and for us is: "God, make me (us) into the people you tell us we are. Amen."

Wish you a truly holy week and joyous Easter!

This month I thought I'd list a few books that I've listened to on Audible over the past couple of months that I thought were good and very relevant for discipleship in the 21st century.

Richard Rohr, *The Divine Dance: The Trinity and Your Transformation*.

Rohr is a widely-read author on things related to Christian spirituality and this is his very practical introduction to the idea of God as Trinity and why that matters to our everyday lives.

Michael J. Sandel, *Justice: What's the Right Thing to Do?*

Sandel has taught this course on justice at Harvard for decades and it has long been one of the most popular courses on campus. In it he provides an overview on this extremely relevant and important topic to help us get our bearings and find the vocabulary we need to understand the conversations that are being had around us.

Amanda Riply, *High Conflict: Why We Get Trapped and How We Get Out.*

As the title suggest, this is a book about conflict and how to navigate it beyond the winner-take -all climate of our times.

Not resuscitation resurrection!



In the early years of the U.S. space program, a small but powerful rocket was supported by a metal framework. This "escape tower" was bolted to the capsule in which astronauts awaited takeoff. If disaster occurred, the escape tower was to carry the capsule up and away from the main rocket. A parachute would then float the astronauts safely to earth.

Jesus' resurrection is more than a great escape. If he had merely eluded death, that would be akin to resuscitation. By God's power, Jesus didn't merely survive death but conguered it, once and for all. On Easter, Jesus returns to life not for his own sake but for the sake of all humanity. He reassures the disciples — and us — "Peace be with you."

Death Doesn't Win



In the final hours of 2021, a wildfire near Boulder, Colorado,

destroyed 1,000 homes, including one belonging to Pastor Bill Stephens. His family, out of town at the time, lost all their possessions. After months of feeling buried in debris, insurance paperwork and mourning, Stephens decided that Easter 2022 would mark a fresh start.

During worship that morning, the pastor shared a photo of vibrant daffodils emerging on his charred property. Burned remnants were visible in the background, just as Easter's backdrop includes the pain and death of Good Friday. But the empty tomb in Easter's foreground means death won't win, reminded Stephens. Even when earthly life "isn't all daffodils," we have hope and eternal life through Jesus.

Easter reveals that God will "give us the joy, and it's going to be in the heart of pain that we go through as well," added the pastor. "And that just makes me draw closer to God."

Lamplighters From Carol Rowlette

Luke 4:38-39. Jesus heals Peter's motherin-law Jesus left the synagogue and went to the home of Simon. Now Simon's mother-in-law was suffering from a high fever, and they asked Jesus to help her. So he bent over her and rebuked the fever, and it left her. She got up at once and began to wait on them.

Hebrews 10:23 Let us hold fast the confes-

sion of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful.

It is amazing that we can read the miracles of Jesus and find much discussion about each one noticing the differences and similarities per gospel writer's observations.



Jesus answers our uncertainties

Thomas didn't believe the other disciples when they said Jesus had risen. The two travelers to Emmaus despaired over Jesus' death, uncertain what might come next.

During our life of faith, we all face guestions, doubts and despair. In Fearless, Max Lucado says Jesus' responses to us echo his responses to the disciples. His answer to our doubt is the same as with Thomas: "Touch my body" — which we do every time we connect with the church (the body of Christ), wounds and all. As with the Emmaus disciples, Jesus urges us to ponder his story found in Scripture — which we do through Bible reading and study. Today, just as long ago, Jesus meets his followers – in his body, in his Word — and strengthens our faith.

The God who hides

Isaiah declares, "Truly, you are a God who hides himself, O God of Israel, the Savior" (45:15, ESV). But why would God hide? Isn't our knowing God the point? Martin Luther explained that God hides in unexpected places so as not to be found where the world assumes a god would be — in power, status, fame, wealth — but to be found in weakness, humility and places of suffering.

"Those who have found God in the cross of Jesus Christ," said 20th-century theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, "know how wonderfully God hides himself in this world and how he is closest precisely when we believe him to be most distant." So God assures us of his presence in the humble manger, among the poor and outcast during his ministry, in the excruciating suffering of the cross, and with us in every struggle.

God hides not to avoid us but so we will discover him precisely where we need him most, and where others need us most.


