Pastor's Corner

Beloved in Christ,

Have I ever told you how much I love the Olympics (especially the Summer Olympics)? I do. I wait for them. I get excited about them and often find myself inspired by them. I love that they are able to conjure up an interest in me in sports that, otherwise, I'm not all that interested in. I can watch handball, water polo, fencing, anything really!...and somehow, because those Olympic rings and that familiar triumphal music is attached to them, I'm enthralled. I love that, during the Olympics, you can walk into almost any pizza place, mall, appliance store—anywhere with a television—and find them on and be able to strike up a conversation with a perfect stranger over the latest goings-on. The agony of disappointment and defeat are as compelling as the ecstasy of victory on the Olympic stage when you take in what those athletes had to do to get where they are and how slim those margins can be between gold medalists and those who don't make the podium at all.

To go along with all of that, though, there can also be messages that accompany the games that, as a pastor, unnerve me. Who can forget the nationalist messages of civilizational superiority that so often accompanied the games during the Cold War, or the overt messages of racial superiority in Munich, where the games were held under the shadow of Nazi symbolism with Adolf Hitler in attendance. Or, even more broadly than either of those examples, what about the way the games subtly communicate and depict for us what it means and what it looks like to be a winner? There can be only one gold medal in each category and all others must depart the playing field with differing degrees of disappointment. This year, there's a particularly poignant Olympic commercial featuring Labron James—this year's Olympic flagbearer and senior veteran of a U.S. men's basketball team stacked to the brim with superstar talent—a commercial about the burden of winning. To be a winner, the commercial says in so many words, is to indenture oneself to an ongoing, almost compulsive need to win because a person is only as successful as their latest performance and if it isn't a win, you can no longer be called a winner. There's a burden in that, the commercial fairly and insightfully observes, because somewhere along the way in the process of sport (and maybe even the process of life itself) winning or losing an athletic contest comes to define who we are as a "winner" or a "loser." Event subtly transforms into identity. For all of the insightful-

ness of that commercial, as a Christian, I find the need to pause over that messaging.

Identity is our core, rock-bottom understanding of who we are and what place we have in the world, and boy is that fragile if it's built on something as tenuous as a win or a loss in a sporting match. I truly wonder how a person could hold up under such conditions to always have their core selfunderstanding be at risk of falling apart or to allow oneself to become compulsively addicted to winning for fear of losing that core. Part of the wisdom of our faith tradition is in making clear just how spiritually destructive this sort of merit-based pathway is and how atodds it is with the workings of God's grace. I want you to try and imagine with me today, friends, that each and every one of you already has the gold medal in your possession. All of the questions of your identity and your worth are already resolved. There are no longer any lingering questions of what you might have to do to earn your medal to prove you're a winner. All of that is in the past—consigned to a different era, an entirely different life. And, maybe, now that you have your gold, you can be settled and free from the "burden of winning." The only real question now is: now that you have your gold, your wholeness, your freedom, where are you willing to allow it to take you? That's grace. Take it and run with it friends!

Economic Justice From UMC Church and Society

Faith-based organizations and institutions of higher education are forming new partnerships to develop affordable rental housing on the land they already own. However, they face barriers like zoning and other policies to develop affordable housing.

Senator Sherrod Brown, Chairman of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs has introduced the Yes In God's Back Yard Act (S. 3910), which supports faith-based organizations and colleges building and preserving affordable housing on their land and reduce barriers to the development of this housing. In addition to The United States' shortage of 7.3 million affordable rental homes, access to affordable rental housing is drastically declining (National Low Income Housing Coalition).

Senator Brown's bill would:

- Provide technical assistance to faithbased organizations and institutions of higher education wanting to use their existing land to increase or preserve the supply of affordable rental housing.
- Provide technical assistance to local governments to learn best practices and how they can facilitate the production of affordable rental housing on land owned by faith-based organizations and institutions of higher education.
- Create challenge grants to provide additional resources to communities that adopt policies that remove barriers to the production and preservation of affordable rental housing on property owned by faith-based organizations and institutions of higher education.

As United Methodists, we are called to help the poor and support policies that aid in alleviating poverty such as access to affordable housing. We "emphasize measures that build and maintain the wealth of poor people" and "call upon churches to develop these and other ministries that promote asset-building among the poor," (The United Methodist Social Principles).

Contact your elected officials today through this form and ask them to pass the Yes In God's Back Yard Act (S. 3910) to support faith-based organizations and colleges who want to build and provide affordable housing on their land.

Although God surely can tackle all the work of ministry and evangelism alone, he "chooses to stoop gracefully to allow me to co-labor with him," said Stevens. What a blessing and privilege that God lets us work alongside him!



As the gospels make clear, even the Son of God needed an occasional break. For Jesus, a solitary place reached by boat served as an oasis.

Although an oasis might make us think of a beach-like vacation spot in the middle of a desert, it's simply "something that provides refuge, relief or pleasant contrast" (Merriam-Webster).

So, what's your oasis? For someone who recently lost a spouse, it could be a break from the newfound silence. For a young parent, it could be a block of solitude and silence to complete a thought.

I haven't found any definition of oasis that includes a timeframe. Such an experience could last 30 seconds or a full week. Work within your circumstances so you can get away for a time with Jesus.

Did you know? "Laity are the primary agents of holy love incarnate in the world: The witness of the laity, their Christ-like examples of everyday living as well as the sharing of their own faith experiences of the gospel, is the primary evangelistic ministry through which all people will come to know Christ and The United Methodist Church will fulfill its mission" (2016 Book of Discipline, ¶127, "The Ministry of the Laity," p. 97

Whan you think of this responsibility, what are your thoughts? I know I have felt overwhelmed by it,: "This job can't be meant for me, can it? What do I know about getting people to come to Christ?"


In September, I will be leading a course called "For the Common Good".
