### Something of Interest From Voice

There was a Celebration of Juneteenth on 6/19 at Bicentennial Park in conjunction with the Granite State organizing Project (GSOP). In case you don't know - slavery legally ended with the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863. Yet two years afterward this was not widely known in Texas. On June 19, 1865, Union troops reached Galveston to begin informing the state's enslaved people they were freed from bondage. Emancipation's anniversary was commemorated at different times throughout subsequent years, but Texas always had Juneteenth. Similar celebrations began to coalesce around that date, too. In 2021, Juneteenth became a federal holiday. The gathering had several speakers, a reading of the Emancipation Proclamation and closing prayer by Pastor John.

As highlighted in the General Board of Church and Society newsletter, you can also watch and share the UMC Juneteenth video <u>"Juneteenth:</u> <u>Hope for the future wrapped in a history Les-</u> <u>son,"</u> produced by United Methodist Communications.


