MISSION IS ABOUT PUTTING THE FACE AND Name of Jesus in Front of Those who don't know him. We can do that in Many Ways — Any place and any day. VOICE From Callie McMahon

In June, Bishop Peggy Johnson published an article intitled "Let's do something on immigration". In that article she sited some scripture verses and asked what those verses meant for us as Christians. Here are the verses.

When a stranger sojourns with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong. You shall treat the stranger who sojourns with you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were strangers in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." — Leviticus 19:33-34

"For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me." — Matthew 25:35

"Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares." — Hebrews 13:2

She said," I can think of few things more challenging than the immigration crisis in the United States today. It is no surprise that our lawmakers are unable to pass laws that will improve this situation. We're stuck! It is complicated, politically divisive, with overtones of racism, xenophobia, greed, nationalism, and fear."

She is so right. Just bringing my thoughts to this newsletter is done cautiously as I know there are so many opinions, but regardless of your opinion, we can all agree that something needs to be done. Bishop Peggy talked about seeing the situation firsthand when she travelled to Brownsville Texas. She talks of "seeing families in cages with children wrapped in mylar blankets, sullen and thin". Our own United Methodist organizations, United Methodist Women in Faith and the Immigration Law and Justice Network issued a statement opposing the action President Biden took in early June, putting a hold on the number of immigrants coming into our borders (limit 2500 between all entry points).

They said, "we believe our country has a moral responsibility to ensure a fair process for asylum seekers and the humane treatment of migrants. As people of faith and as people of moral conscience, we demand better."

I agree, we can do better, I will list the ideas Bishop Peggy recommends at the end of this article, but I want to add a few thoughts to move us to action.

Can we think of a situation that would spur us to move our families out of our hometown? What would it have to look like to move your family, can we even imagine something that would send us off on a long, dangerous trip to the unknown? I do not believe that we, like a vast majority of Americans who live in relative peace and safety can imagine it. I think, because we can't, we might use an inability to empathize as a free pass that brings us to the conclusion that, "they're just taking advantage of us", or they want a free ride, or any other words you might say that clearly show our inability to put ourselves in such a mindset; to walk a mile in their shoes. I have no intention of trying to change your beliefs, but I would

Reflection:


Firelight brings us to communal spaces of cooking, warmth and song. I learned this with the Girl Scouts at Camp Yankee Trails, CT:

urge you to remember there are real, live, flesh and blood, children of God who suffer enough to take such drastic and for us, uncomprehensible action.

Bishop Peggy adds; "I just want to say one thing: **do something**."

Here are some ideas: pray, give money to immigration support groups, volunteer to help with the immigrant people in your community, contact your lawmakers. You can choose but do something. Doing nothing makes us complicit with the status quo.

Bishop Peggy has been reading <u>Everyday</u> <u>Ubuntu: Living Better Together the African</u> <u>Way</u> by Mungi Ngomane, and says she loves this quote: "Apathy and isolation have sometimes led us to think our contribution to causes we believe in has no value. However, we all have a voice. And its loudest when it's expressed alongside the voices of others. There is always strength in numbers." We may not be able to fix this huge problem but we can make a difference. It will give life and hope to people who are living under great oppression. It is far better to do something to help than to complain.


