Pastor's Corner

Co-travellers in Christ,

It's June, which in the United Methodist world means that it's Annual Conference season, and in light of all that I have been preaching about lately and all that we've been celebrating with Ascension and Pentecost and (coming up) Trinity Sunday, I'd like to take some time in my pastor's corner to say a few words on what that means (or is supposed to mean). In the Methodist world, the word "conference" is both a noun and a verb: it is the gathering together to discern God's leading in our collective life and it is also *the way in which we enter into that discernment*. The latter is the more distinctively Methodist idea and practice and another way of saying it is what we call "holy conferencing."

Let's think about that together. What might make a conference a holy thing, a sacred experience? I've been to a lot of conferences that were not so holy (and I imagine you have too). People vying for the floor, often just to hear themselves speak; grand-standing more for personal posturing than to meaningfully contribute to a conversation; an undercurrent of hyper-competitivism contributing to a climate in which you're likely to be attacked for saying something just because you dared to say it. Unfortunately, those sorts of things can be all too typical of professional conferences, especially in competitive fields, and one seldom leaves with the sense that the conference has drawn us closer together, brought out the best in all of us as a group, brought us into a shared encounter with the holy, moved us forward together in a shared understanding of God's directions for our life and mission. One can leave a conference feeling more isolated and alone in the work than when you arrived.

"Holy Conferencing", though, is a different attitude and a different approach to coming together as the people of God. It's rooted in the Pentecost conviction that we really do need one another's input and participation and invested, prayerful hearts deeply involved in all that is before us when we gather in this way. Often, those prayers are going to be prayers that God would remind us and call us back into the spirit of this work; sometimes, they're going to be for clarity of heart

and mind; sometimes that God would help us get out of our own way. John Wesley once famously said that "there is no holiness but social holiness" and what he meant by that is that there's no becoming more holy alone—it's something we can only do together "in society" (as he would have put it in 18th century speak). Imagine emerging from a conference where this sort of practice was the main item on the agenda—how energizing and refreshing and encouraging it would be. It would send us forth ready and clear and hopeful, wouldn't it? As we approach conference season this year, that's what I hope for. As we look ahead to what our church will become in the future, this experience, this disciplined style of gathering is what I pray for.

May our conferencing together always leave us filled and energized for God's work!

James K. Drew, Jr. and Mark W. Foreman, *How Do We Know: An Introduction to Epistemology.*

Have you ever asked yourself questions like "How do we know what we think we know? How can we be certain? What is knowledge anyway?" Those are central question in the field of epistemology and Drew and Foreman do a good job in their introductory book in laying out the basics for Christians in an accessible way and paving the way toward deeper study.

Daniel Okrent, The Guarded Gate: Bigotry, Eugenics, and the Law that Kept Two Generations of Jews, Italians, and Other European Immigrants Out of America.

This book tells a shocking story about a chapter in our country's history that has a continuing legacy in our contemporary life. Well-documented, compelling, and current in surprising ways, Okrent's tell-ing of the story of American immigration policy debates at the turn of the 20th century will get you asking questions about the role of the Church in our society to-day.


UMCOR Hygiene Kits A Big

From VOICE

A number of us attended the unveiling of the historic marker honoring Harriet Wilson on May 20th at the Town Hall. The marker is near the statue of Harriet and her son George, which was dedicated in 2006 on South Street. Harriet was the first Black woman to publish a novel in the United States - titled "Our Nig; Sketches from the Life of a Free Black, In a Two-Story White House, North" published in 1859. It lays out the hardship and abuse she endured. The historic marker project was spearheaded by JerriAnne Boggis, director of the Black Heritage Trail of NH (BHTNH) and the Milford Historical Society – who both spoke at the event.

There was a play (co-written by Gloria Henry and JerriAnne Boggis from the Black Heritage Trail of New Hampshire and produced by Najee Brown of Theatre for the People) depicting Harriet at various ages. Also incredibly interesting and unbeknownst to me were exhibits depicting Milford's involvement in slavery and the houses that were involved in the underground railroad.

Claire Holston read the marker to the crowd who walked down to Bicentennial Park from the Town Hall to witness the unveiling where several people spoke, including Melanie Levesque – first black senator in NH. The 'Mapping Untold Stories' project by BHTNH has established other markers in different parts of the state (6 so far including Portsmouth, Windham and Hancock – with Nashua being added May 30th) to visibly honor and share a truer and more complete history of NH and to testify to the NH's rich Black history.

So sometimes it's not about leading a march or getting involved in big events (although that's great!) – sometimes it's just about showing up in your own town to support folks that are doing the work and let



them know that we see them and they matter.

The church hive.

Bees live in a cooperative way described as "eusociality," or good relations. Each bee contributes a



specific skill to the colony, synchronizing its efforts for the benefit of all. Likewise, a church's health depends on all members fulfilling their responsibility to the organism as a whole. Descriptions of hive life mirror Paul's words about the body of Christ, with members having different gifts "but the same Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:4).

According to R.S. Beal Jr., who was both a pastor and a zoology professor, a beehive is the perfect "living illustration of how to walk in unity." He wrote, "Those of us who have believed in Jesus belong to one another just as much as we belong to Christ. We cannot live independently of one another anymore than we can live independently of Christ. Like the bees, we must learn to practice the sacrifice, labor, sharing, and submission of love that together we 'may grow up into him in all things, which is the head, even Christ'" (Ephesians 4:15, KJV). How are you using your own spiritual gifts to build up your church "hive"?

Divine Dance

Using the fancy word *perichoresis* (from Greek for "around" and "contain") may win you admiring — or strange! — looks. But since the 7th century, people have used it as a beautiful image of the Persons of the Holy Trinity containing and permeating one another. A more familiar word, *choreography*, has led to recent understandings of perichoresis as the divine and eternal dance of love.

Picture three dancers' synchronized yet independent movements. Weaving gracefully in and out, each seems to know what the others will do next. They may touch lightly but don't constrain or impede one another. Though distinct individuals, they move so fluidly together that they are, in a sense, one entity.

Even more profound: Jesus invites us into the dance! "If you love me," he says, "you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth. ... I will come to you. ... I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you" (John 14:15-20, ESV). As the actions of Jesus, the Father and the Spirit interweave in Scripture and in the world, may our lives too be drawn into the loving dance.




