Siblings in Christ,

As we enter into March and dip our toes ever-deeper into this year's Lenten season, you may have picked up by now that I've set this season apart this year to really think and pray hard on the subject of forgiveness. Lent, of course, is the season we set aside to spiritually prepare ourselves for Holy Week and Easter—traditionally, the season when those who had been in a longer (usually 3-year) stretch of pre-baptismal education and preparation were nearing the end and making final decisions about whether taking on the life of a Christian was really something they were prepared to commit themselves to. It was a daunting proposition for them, because after that three-year intensive, they were beginning to understand its high calling—the call to practice radical forgiveness being one of the more formidable challenges involved. As I sit and write this today, I am trying to put myself in their position. Having gotten past the basics and having gotten a better appreciation of what this life asks of me and why, they must have taken one last sobering look at it and themselves in that final Lenten season before their baptisms and asked: can I really do this? Can I really live like that? Am I really ready to be baptized into that?

Looking through Lent toward Easter morning, which one of these seems more impossible to you—that the crucified could have been raised or that the crucified one could have forgiven the ones who crucified him? That may not be such a simple question, because forgiveness can be every bit as hard as raising the dead. And yet, Easter is both, isn't it? Both a day of resurrection and a day in which forgiveness is proclaimed because the harm has been radically undone! What if, in that same Easter even, the harm done to you was also radically undone, radically relativized in light of the newness of life that's freshly on offer at Easter? What if all of the sting of that harm was suddenly revealed to be meaningless in comparison to what God has done, in comparison to what the future now holds—would you still hang onto the sting of the past? I think those early-church catechumens must have asked that very question of themselves, as do we all. And so I leave that question with you to ponder as we begin our journey. May this be a holy Lenten season for you.

### How Jesus says your name

It's been said that when someone loves you, they say your name differently. Your name is "safe" coming from their mouth.

Mary Magdalene found this to be true. Walking alone in the dark to Jesus' tomb, she wanted nothing less than for a concerned loved one to interrupt her private grief, crooning her name in pity: "Oh, Mary, there, there." Or worse, someone from her old life who would spit her name like a curse, not knowing that Jesus had cast out her demons. But then Mary saw the tomb open and panicked, ran to get Simon, hurried back to the garden. Angels addressed her — not by name, just "Woman ..." — and then a gardener: "Woman ..."

Except then — "Mary" — this man knew her after all, speaking her name so knowingly, tenderly, lovingly that she recognized him. "Mary." Her name was safe in his mouth, her life safe in his care. He wasn't the gardener. He was her teacher, her friend, her Savior.

Friend, your name also is safe in Jesus' mouth, your life safe in his care, for he loves you deeply.

## Something you can do!

What the world saw happen to Tyre Nichols was a travesty. Tyre's memory will forever be a reminder that our policing system must be transformed without delay.

It is no secret that our justice system is in need of deep repair. For far too long it has functioned outside of the biblical mandate of doing justice and seeking mercy. Time and time again we have witnessed innocent Black people murdered—Trayvon Martin, Tamir Rice, Sandra Bland, Michael Brown, Walter Scott, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, Atatiana Jefferson and Botham Jean, just to name a few—at the hands of police.

As United Methodists, our Social Principles, state that when it comes to criminal justice, "we reject all careless, callous, or discriminatory enforcement of law." Furthermore, "we urge the creation of a genuinely new system for care and restoration of victims, offenders, criminal justice officials, and the community as a whole." (Social Principles ¶164.H)

As United Methodists we support policies that keep our communities safe and reflect our understanding of true justice for all. Today, we call on the 118th Congress to support the George Floyd Justice in Policing Act - meaningful police reform that will hold officers accountable to the communities they serve, and justice for victims

Tyre Nichols along with countless others should be alive today. Let us be empowered by the Holy Spirit to take action and bring about the necessary change for a better criminal justice system, better humanity and a better world.

#### **Family Life**

Family Life is a Christian community focused on nurturing faith for children, youth families and parents.

Come learn, share, and grow in God's love together. We learn the stories of our faith and share the stories of our lives. We journey together on the Christian path as a community of faith. Groups gather to grow our experiential relationship with the Living God both personally and with each other.

#### **Family Worship Room:**

A family worship room open each Sunday at 8:15 a.m., for families who wish to worship together with their young children in a child-centered space listening to the service on a live audio feed.

Childcare is provided for families who wish to drop off toddlers with our nurturing caregivers during both services.

#### Children's Church:

Our classes are a space of love, life, learning, questions, and laughter as we learn and grow in God's love. With interactive lessons targeting all the senses and grounded in the Word of God we learn our faith stories, do activities and how to be in community with each other and the world we live in.

Children ages 5-12 are welcome to join us for **Children's Church** Sunday Mornings from 9:40-10:20 in our Family Classroom.

Teens are welcome to see LeeAnne if they feel called to serve in Youth and Family Ministries.

#### **Family Worship:**

Children are **welcome to remain in worship with their parents.** A message for all ages is offered during all worship services for the young and the young at heart. All are welcome to do activities provided including Children's Worship Bulletins.

#### **Prayground**

Please stay tuned for our Prayground, a child-centered sanctuary space for children to interact with puzzles and books as well as mindful practices for children to use while listening to worship.


Miller concludes:
