Pastor's Corner

Beloved in Christ,

Our explorations through the Epistle of James over the last month or so has kept this topic of "uncommon wisdom" front and center on my mind as we enter into October. It has reminded me that wisdom does not, in fact, always come easily, that it's something to be sought and strived after rather than something that just effortlessly falls into our laps, that it calls for practice and practices that ground and focus our hearts and minds, that it often pulls and tugs at us mightily to yank our wheels out of their well-worn ruts and onto new and less-ventured pathways that always feel foreign and uncomfortable at first until we habituate ourselves to their rhythms and patterns. That impresses me today as a difficult pursuit. That must be why true wisdom seems so uncommon.

One of the great wisdom books of the Bible—the Book of Proverbs—opens with a reminder that true wisdom really takes work to acquire, that it is to be taken up and mastered like some kind of craft.

The proverbs of Solomon, son of David, King of Israel: For learning about wisdom and instruction, For understanding words of insight, For gaining instruction in wise dealings, righteousness, justice, and equity; To teach shrewdness to the simple,

Knowledge and prudence to the young— Let the wise also hear and gain in learning and the discerning acquire

To understand a proverb and a figure, the words of the wise and their riddles... (Prov. 1:1-6)

Proverbs offers itself as an instruction manual of sorts—as a tome of time -tested, generational wisdom to be put to use by those who would get going on the work that it takes to gain skill in the wisdom of life. And then the opening section closes with the culminating wisdom of v. 7, which offers that "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge."

In the time we've been spending with James this last month, we've had a

chance to explore a few of those key skills in the wisdom of life, but today I'm wondering about going further and deeper. Have we arrived yet at that place where Proverbs or James intends for us to arrive? Are we wise yet? Have we learned all we need to learn to get there? Have we put what we have learned into practice? My sense is that we're still somewhere on the road to mastery and that means that we must still harbor a learner's heart and a student's selfawareness to get any further. The times we are living through are extremely complex. The choices we are faced with are often convoluted. I am convinced, though, that God's forward lead can always be found where hearts are humble, focused upon God's good intentions for this world, intent on learning, and ready to follow the master's lead. May this be the spirit in our hearts as we continue to grow in wisdom and follow where it leads!

Thy Will Be Done What do we need to let go of to make room for something new? How can we trust God more and stop praying for outcomes or telling God how to answer our prayers?

Nearly a year ago, our Daisy-dog rode with me far, far away to our vet who lives in Barnstead, NH. Brian, DVM, had come to the house as he usually did and found some serious concerns with our girl-a few teeth needed to come out and her heart murmur was bad. She needed surgery and we weren't sure she would survive the anesthesia.

We prayed about it as a family, and wondered how God was going to help. God always helps.

We put our trust in our vet and in God. As we said our goodbyes, I choked up and grabbed one last furry kiss. I watched as Daisy was carried away. Wags! She wags. My heart was still heavy.

On the long road home, I found myself behind a truck with the words, *Thy will be done* painted across the back in large gold letters. Ha! That can mean she lives and that can mean she dies I thought. I choked up again and tried to breath. Just breathe. I prayed. I asked God for courage and for Daisy's healing and that God be with Brian as he did the surgery. I asked God to show up in tangible ways that I could understand.

I drove miles and miles and miles homeward bound. It struck me that God's will

might be that Daisy die on that operating table and that praying God's will be done needed to include that possibility....hmm.

I started to imagine all the possible outcomes. I held the picture of her wags and her healthy self in my mind's eye. I imagined radiant, glowing healing light surrounding Daisy and Brian DVM. I imagined the possibility that dying in surgery might be gentler than dying of infection and a weak heart.

Thy will be done-there's that truck again. (Really!) Peace passed through me as I drove, and I received the message "for reals" this time. God's way is better than my way. My grace is enough; it's all you need. My strength comes into its own in your weakness. 2 Corinthians 12:9

Daisy is healthy and healed. She wags, wags, wags. We plan to bring her to our Blessing of the Animals Sunday October 6. I hope to see you there!



Crop Walk For Hunger From Pat Rafter

Greater Nashua Crop Hunger Walk is Sunday Nov 3 1-3:30. The Crop Hunger Walk is a fundraiser for Church World Services. An organization who's vision is to create a world where everyone has food, a voice and a safe place to call home. We help by walking in area walks asking for donations from friends and family. Each area walk has the ability to request 25% of funds raised to stay local. The Greater Nashua Crop Hunger Walk gives its 25% to 4 area food pantries. The Nashua Soup Kitchen, Corpus Cristi Food Pantry, St James of Merrimack Food Pantry and SHARE Inc of Milford. Last year's walk raised a little over \$49,000 giving \$3069 to each of these local pantries! Over 300 people walked, among them about 25 folks (and 3 dogs) from our congregation. Our walkers contributed to over \$5,000 of the funds raised. How awesome is that! A few hours of your time can mean so much. The event kicks off at 1 from Temple Beth Abraham in Nashua with a nice stroll through downtown Nashua and North Nashua neighborhoods, and back to the temple. The walk is followed by a luncheon under the big tent with live music. Please sign up on line or see me for details.

If you can't participate in the walk, but would like to sponsor someone, go to the site (greater Nashua CROP Hunger Walk 2024, scroll down to list of teams, then click on Milford United Methodist, choose someone on the list of walkers and hit donate. OR I will have a list of walkers posted in the Narthex. You can find them and give a donation to them directly, though online donations are preferred it saves our walkers time waiting in registration lines.

There are shirts for sale for walkers that might want a shirt to commemorate the event (\$15 each). I have some if you would like to purchase in advance.

Let's make a great MUMC presence this year! The more the merrier!!


