September is here and, I don't know about you, but this time of year with school starting, apples ripening, and the summer rhythm interrupted by a new sort of bustle somehow strikes a chime deep in my soul that lets me know it's time for movement. If you are entering this Fall season like me sensing that urgency to begin, let me offer some on-ramps as to how. We're going to kick-start our Fall beginnings at MUMC with Homecoming Sunday on September 10 at a combined 10:30 service with refreshments and time to gather afterwards. Along with that, on Wednesday evenings beginning that week (9/13) we'll be bringing back our Wednesday Potluck and Study series—this Fall, reading Ann Garrido's book *Redeeming Conflict*—a truly amazing little book and I look forward to sharing it with you. We'll be jumping into missions again with the CROP Walk, SHARE Suppers, and new initiatives like taking part in the Green Church Movement. There are ways to get involved with our music program through choir, bells, and the praise band and, if you're only available for select seasons of the year, you can look out for announcements about the Christmas concert later in

the Fall. The Pastor's Bible Study (hybrid) will continue to meet weekly on Thursdays at 12:30 pm to study the daily lectionary readings and much more as well with the Lamplighters, White Tops, and the Sunday evening United Methodist Men's Group, and the Children's Program! Come find a place to begin!

Here are a couple of books that I've been reading (or listening to) lately. If the subject interests you, let's talk!

Flannery O'Connor, Wise Blood.

One of the few (only) novels by this important Christian short-story author, who writes with a powerful and provocative style on themes of perennial importance.

Andrew Davidson, ed., *Imaginative Apologetics: Theology, Philosophy, and the Catholic Tradition*.

A collection of essays by an interdenominational cast of currently-influential theologians

on what it might be today to offer and defend the Gospel of Jesus Christ within our contemporary global context. It includes fascinating surveys of where we've been on this, mistakes we've made, and different approaches taken as well as the role of awakening imagination within this task.

Charles R. Wilson, Baptized in Blood: The Religion of the Lost Cause, 1865-1920.

An historical exposé about Christianity and Racism in the South during the Reconstruction and its legacy today.



# Something to think about. **VOICE**

The United Methodist Church sends out a newsletter called 'United Methodist Now' which had an article I found thought provoking. It was about the 'radical act of hospitality' which is offering hospitality in a fundamentally different way. It highlighted what different churches are doing to shift from offering welcome, to an 'outward movement to stand with others'— especially those folks at the margins of society. They are widening their circle so all people know God's welcome. One Church was offering service in the afternoon for the homeless, another was doing home/ retirement home/assisted living visits to the elderly and a third was working with those released from prison to help with their basic needs. What can you do, what can we as a Church do...to put into action our own radical hospitality?

#### Instruments of connection


Following Jesus involves much more than attending worship, as Pastor Stan Purdum points out in a sermon titled "The Hug":
