Pastor's Corner

Beloved in Christ,

I saw something fascinating the other day during a few days off in this new Easter season. This week is Spring Break for my kids and, to boot, it was Leila's birthday and we were down in Boston and decided we'd go to the aquarium (which I had never been to before). After looking around for a while and making our way through the different floors, there was an announcement that it was almost lunchtime for the sea lions and so we headed that way for the show. Well, it was readily apparent by the time we got there that the sea lions had heard that announcement as well. The surface of the water was churning and splashing with their anxious energy. There was a hallway just off to the right where the trainers would eventually come out with their toys and fish and two or three of the sea lions were transfixed with what was about to emerge out from that hallway. One of the sea lions was beside herself. She would jump up out of the water onto the platform and peer down the hallway and bark loudly, then she'd jump back in the water for a spin or two and jump back out again for another bark or two in hopes that the trainers would get the message. After that didn't work, she tried going further down the hallway and barking even louder and then jump into the water again. That went on for about 10 minutes. Another sea lion had clearly heard the same announcement but decided instead to plop themself down calm and still at the end of that same hallway—no barking, no going back and forth in and out of the water, just patiently waiting. The rest mostly went about their business (although clearly also excited that lunchtime was near), but the contrasting attitudes and actions of these other two was as close as I've ever seen to a parable in action.

The trainers eventually arrived with a bucket of fish for each. All of the sea lions were fed at roughly the same time after a few tricks and waves to the audience. I have to imagine that something like this scene is probably the story of every feeding time. The hyperactive sea lion didn't get any more fish any sooner than the rest for all of its anxiousness. The patient sea lion didn't get better treatment either, in the end, than any of the other seals that were less focused on the hallway. If love can be measured in fish, all of them were equally loved and equally attended to by their trainers. And yet, there does seem to be a meaningful difference among the sea lions—particularly between the one who begged franticly

and the one who waited, almost rested, patiently. Sometimes I think we pray like that anxious sea lion—worried and frantic as though we don't know where our next meal might come from, even while every other meal has come on time; uncertain that we're loved and provided for; causing ourselves and others around us anxiety even though that attitude doesn't yield a better result. Where in scripture does it say that anxiety in prayer pays dividends? I'm only aware of the place that says "the prayer of the faithful avails much" (James 5:16). Which sea lion resembles faith? As we head into May, my prayer for you is that, whatever you're waiting for, whatever you've been praying for fervently, that these two sea lions might have something to say to you about the expectations and attitudes we bring to our prayers. Even as you wait, may you find the grace to rest confidently in the one who loves you without question.

Timothy Barnes, Constantine: Dynasty, Religion and Power in the Later Roman Empire.

Who was this Roman emperor that was so consequential in the history of the church and still so relevant to ongoing discussions today? The emperor who declared toleration, the emperor who convened the first ecumenical council at Nicaea. the emperor who founded and funded so many famous churches world-wide and, with his establishment of Christianity in the West, left the church with so many vexing questions about how we ought to think about our life in connection with that of the larger society and world. Barnes is regarded as the foremost living authority on Constantine

thority on Constantine and this book (published in 2014) is something of a capstone on a lifetime of research and publishing.



About thirty-five of us showed up in the rain at the Nehemiah Havward Homestead here in Milford to celebrate the Black Heritage Trail of NH Harriet Wilson marker unveiling. David and Liisa Palance own the home on Maple Street which housed Harriet Wilson where she was indentured until age 18. Harriet was the first African American female novelist to be published in the US. As the marker states, 'Harriet was subject to inhumane treatment which deeply influenced her writing. Wilson's life, and her novel confronting the harsh realities of her time, are a testament to her resilience, courage and fortitude'

Dear Lord, thank you for the blessings of children and families. Help us rely on you for guidance, patience and even-temperedness throughout our days.



A Long Talk About the Uncomfortable Truth

Our Church Conference Commission on Religion and Race offered clergy and laity an opportunity to participate in A Long Talk About the Uncomfortable Truth, a 21 day anti-racism activation experience geared to putting an anti-racist at every dinner table in America to join in these uncomfortable but necessary conversations. I'm glad I decided to participate. The first thing they did was ask us to watch the video 'The History of Race in America'. I sent this out to a number of folks. It takes you through the US' history of anti-Black racism from 1619 to present, showing how the legacy of slavery & the myth of white supremacy impacts every aspect of our society. In session 1 "Unpacking the Truth." we explored the historical roots of systemic racism and began essential discussions about its ongoing impact. In session 2 "Finding Your Voice," we focused on practical tools for change – learning about the CPR Protocol, a powerful approach to confidently address problematic statements and take meaningful steps in antiracism. We role-played in how to Clarify, **P**robe & **R**edirect when we find ourselves in racist conversations with people. Only by engaging with people can we truly institute change and eradicate racism.
